

Welcome: An Introduction from Liv Lorent MBE, Artistic Director

2021-2022

As the country continues to recover from the impacts that the pandemic had on all our lives, I look back with extreme pride at the way balletLORENT adapted and transformed our model in response to the uncertain and volatile circumstances. Through a shift in artistic and participatory programmes, we not only supported our valued freelance artists and dancers throughout, but also engaged in a wide range of adapted projects, taking us to even greater success.

One of our most memorable moments of the last year was our return to touring, which saw us take *The Lost Happy Endings* to six large-scale theatres across England and Scotland. At a time when audiences were reluctant to return to theatres, we enthralled over 4000 people across 23 shows, as well as engaging 663 children in our related Creative Activity Pack project. On top of this, we created a site-specific work (*Parade*) at Cheeseburn Sculpture Gardens in Northumberland, plus three films.

In May, we moved into our new home at John Marley Centre in Newcastle's West End. This space will become a centre that has national significance for creative inclusion, and allow our own original work to flourish, expand our nationally recognised education programme, and give us a platform from which to engage local communities to offer cultural experiences that otherwise would not be open to them.

In September, we launched our pilot Youth Academy for exceptionally talented children from Newcastle who we have met through workshops in primary schools in areas of disadvantage. Many have performed in our middle scale fairytale productions alongside our professional company. Most wouldn't ordinarily have access to dance or creative activity, and this unique opportunity for children already benefits 20 members.

The Future


Looking towards the future, I am very excited about balletLORENT's development and growth. We will establish John Marley as a fully accessible space by progressing a pioneering Capital Project, that when fully funded, will make our West End home a world class centre of excellence, with the ability to offer rehearsal, education, and performance space for balletLORENT, as well as other local community organisations. This development will enhance balletLORENT's status nationally as a company committed to inclusive opportunity and artistic programming, as we strengthen our position as advocates, changemakers, and leaders in inclusion.

We will grow our Youth Academy to full capacity with 40 children across two strands, an intermediate feeder programme, and a more technically challenging programme with further performance opportunities. These children will go on to obtain a keen and invested interest in the arts, with many gaining a firm footing to go forward into a professional artistic career, and some will almost certainly become core **ballet**LORENT dancers of the future.

We will launch a new, bespoke digital platform **ballet**LORENT at Home in April 2022, to showcase our broad and exciting range of filmed work, and to act as an interactive education portal for our Learning and Participation programmes. This will significantly expand our digital offering, with adaptations of our performances alongside custommade films hosted on the distinctive platform. Many of our current and archival films will be shown at film festivals across the world this year.

We will remount our 2012 production *Rapunzel*, and create an alternative version of the same piece for our adult-oriented strand, *After Dark*, both of which will premiere at Northern Stage Newcastle on the 29th and 30th September 2022, and tour nationally in 2023. Alongside this, we are also developing a new, immersive work, titled *ANEMOIA*, which will premiere in January 2023.

We have a lot to be proud of, and much to look forward to, and we can't wait to share our future with you.



An original story by **Carol Ann Duffy DBE** retold as dance theatre for family, **The Lost Happy Endings** premiered at Northern Stage, Newcastle in 2019, with artistic contributions from a world-class star-studded and acclaimed team of collaborators, who helped to form a vivid backdrop in front of which our charismatic dancers performed a visual and theatrical feast, while emotionally connecting with our audiences. We were also delighted to **welcome**

Benedicta Valentina Mamuini into her first lead role with the company, exquisitely dancing as Jub, the "six-fingered Deario". Benedicta was joined by a cast of nine professional dancers, ranging in ages from 20 to 57.

Gardens in Northumberland, **Parade** was an uplifting experience for audiences post lockdown and devised in the spirit of celebrating difference.


Parade featured 12 dancers aged 22 to 57, with music composed and played by 13-year-old composer/musician Albie Crompton, and costumes designed and realised by Nasir

Mazhar. A film adaptation of Parade will be released on our new streaming site in April 2022.

In December, we presented a **free one-act version**of The Lost Happy Endings at the John Marley
Centre for 360 children from four local primary schools
(Bridgewater, Excelsior, Broadwood, and St Bede's RC), and
families from West End Foodbank, West End Women and
Girls Centre, and West End Refugee Service. This opportunity
allowed children and families facing
economic exclusion to experience dance
within their local community, many for the
first time in their lives.

Ahead of launching our new, bespoke digital platform, to showcase our broad and exciting range of work, we continue to expand our collection of dance for film, creating several new pieces over the course of the last year.

Our feature length films continue to be enjoyed by UK and international audiences alike, as they are streamed through

Marquee TV and Sky Arts. Our filmed version of The

Lost Happy Endings, created in October 2020, is exclusive to Marquee TV, and has been viewed by 1,746 people to

date. **Rumpelstiltskin** (2017) has achieved 2,926 views through Marquee TV, and is also available via Sky Arts.

To recognise **International Men's Day 2021**, we created a short film **Breaking Grey**, filmed, and edited by Albie Crompton (13 years old), and featuring two of **ballet**LORENT's long-term male dance artists, Gavin Coward and Toby Fitzgibbons.

After years of nomadic studio hopping, we are thrilled to begin relocating to a **new combined rehearsal**, **education**, **and administrative base at the John Marley Centre**, Scotswood, in the West End of Newcastle. Within the grade two listed former school, we will establish a safe, fully accessible and inclusive creative and learning environment, including a sensory zone, for all participants of our classes, and audiences.

We relish the opportunity to build and expand partnerships in and around our new home, and look forward to working with, and being inspired by, the children, young and older people, and families who are welcoming us to their community.


The full potential of this space, location and the local communities is driving balletLORENT's drive to make it a world class centre of excellence, offering rehearsal, education, and performance opportunities.

with balletLORENT! We know through decades of working at grassroots level that talent is abundant, but opportunity is not. Our learning and participation programmes go the extra mile to remove barriers to engagement, giving meaningful cultural opportunities to children, young people, and older people, those who are from underprivileged communities, refugees, those who are neurodivergent, and those living in poverty.

We launched our **Youth Academy** (one year pilot) in August to offer 20 exceptionally talented local children (aged 7-13) the opportunity to develop their creative talents formally and consistently. Children meet weekly to advance their movement and choreographic abilities, working closely with our artistic team and guest collaborators. We recognise their breadth of talent, respond to their needs as individuals, and are delivering a programme to train them in movement, design, and music elements, and increase their creativity in making shows.

Most participants are from the 30% most deprived areas of the city, training is free, and children are fed and chaperoned during their time with us.

Devised in response to COVID-19 restrictions, our

Creative Activity Packs allowed children to explore a wide range of activities based on *The Lost Happy Endings* in school or at home, and share their artistic creations with friends, families, and our team. We were overwhelmed by the children's enthusiasm, achievements, and wonderful creativity. Children have been able to find expressive freedom, gain confidence in their creative abilities, articulate ideas and opinions about their own artistic choices, and participate in physical and creative activity, all for free.

The arts and crafts were fantastic. Children of all ages, abilities and languages were able to access these. Turning the box into a stage was a great idea!

Creative Activity Packs Project

423 children from Six Schools in Newcastle, North Tyneside, Northumberland, and Kirkcaldy watched a screening of *The Lost Happy Endings* film in school, participated in creative dance sessions and took part in a celebration event where they

could share the activities they had completed. In Hull, 237

children from four primary schools attended a performance of *The Lost Happy Endings* at Hull New Theatre before participating in the project.


balletLORENT also delivered several bespoke projects tailored to the needs of schools and communities across the North East and Yorkshire, including:

- A six-week creative dance residency for year three children from Westgate Hill Primary School Newcastle, and South Gosforth First School
- Project A, a one-year actor training course at Newcastle Theatre Royal (weeklong residency)
- Family Workshops at Scotswood Community Gardens, Newcastle commissioned by Arts Connect
- Residency with students from the Darlington Centre for Advanced Training (CAT)
- Online Classes Dance Fit, Pilates, Creative Dance Theatre for Children
- A deeper Engagement Programme for schools and communities in Hull, in partnership with Hull Dance
- Creative dance workshops and career talks for year 70 pupils (aged 7-16) at Collingwood School and Media Arts College, Morpeth

In 2021-22, our team engaged with 2809 children, young people and adults from all over the country. This is an exceptional number of people to have benefitted from our work, especially given the continuing restrictions to activity that COVID-19 recovery required.
